At Heathfield we have personalised our curriculum around the Heathfield Heart, the Heathfield Head and the Heathfield Hands.

Heathfield Heart demonstrate the character traits to prepare our children for life in the modern world. These character traits are pertinent to our children and community therefore, we feel it is essential for children to have the opportunity to explore these further in all aspects of their learning. Within Early Years, we recognise the importance of the Characteristics of Effective Learning. They detail the way in which children learn from their environment and the opportunities they are given. Our Heathfield Heart is established through these Characteristics of Effective Learning (CoEL). The following table shows how these characteristics link to the character traits we endeavour all children to build upon throughout their time at Heathfield.
