

Geography: What makes a hero super?

What should I already know?

In EYFS I looked at different ways of moving in a space successfully, anticlockwise as a direction, comparing similarities and differences of people and places and 2D shapes. I also learned about the features of my immediate environment and how environments might vary from one another. In Year I, I studied seasonal and daily weather patterns in the UK. I created a simple map using symbols in a key and used directional language to describe a location on a map. I learnt the difference between the UK and Great Britain. We focused landmarks including castles and palaces and looked at the similarities and difference between physical and human features of London and Sandringham.

Seasons	The 4 divisions of the year (spring, summer, autumn, winter) and the related features.
Temperature	The measurement of how hot or cold something/somewhere is.
Forecast	A forecast tells us what the weather is going to be like in the near future (next few days)
Reporter	A person who reports information, e.g. a weather reporter tells us about the weather on the TV/radio.
Climate	Like the weather but over a longer period of time. Average measurements of temperature, rain, wind etc.
Poles	The 2 opposite points on the Earth's surface (North Pole and South Pole). The North and South Poles receive no sunlight during the winter months. The North Pole is generally warmer than the South Pole.
Equator	An imaginary circle around the Earth. It divides the Earth into Northern and Southern hemisphere. Countries nearest the equator are hotter. Countries further away from the equator are colder.
Meteorologist	An expert in weather forecasting.












Captain Scott:
