

Geography: How have our lives been affected by Anglo Saxons?

What should I already know?

In KS1 I have located the 7 continents and seas. I have a sound understanding of where Britain is in relation to the equator and the northern and southern hemisphere.. I have looked at famous landmarks of London and understand some physical and human features of the land. I have studied the physical features of the United Kingdom in relation to rivers and mountains and the physical and human features of Egypt. In KS2 I learned to name and locate the UK on a European map and name and locate the countries and cities of the UK. I can locate the geographical regions of Britain through landscapes, human and physical. I can compare and contrast land use during the Stone Age to land in Britain now In Year 4. I learnt the eight points on a compass and have also explored using four figure grid references. I applied this knowledge to orienteering using maps and symbols. I learnt about geographical features of Greece and its location in comparison to UK.

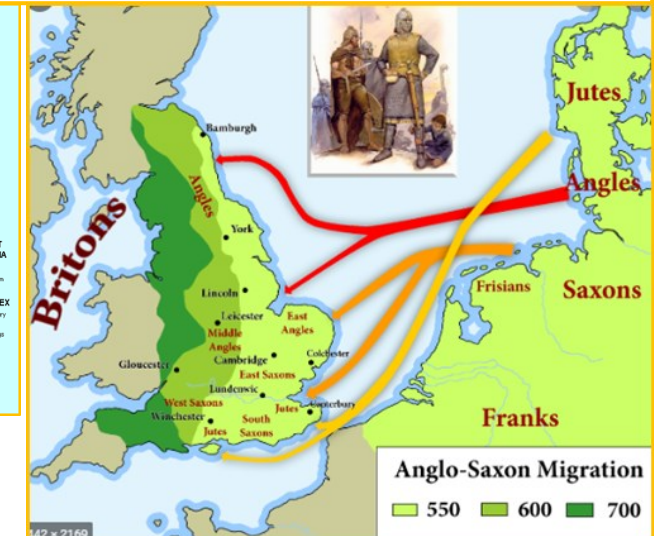
Settlement	A place, typically one which has previously been uninhabited, where people establish a community
Barrow	A two-wheeled handcart used especially by street vendors
Longboats	A large boat which may be launched from a sailing ship
Bourne	An intermittent stream, flowing from a spring
Kingdom	A country, state, or territory ruled by a king or queen
Minerals	A solid, naturally occurring inorganic substance
Homeland	A person's or a people's native land
Polluted	Contaminated with harmful or poisonous substances

The Anglo-Saxons left their homelands in Northern Germany, Denmark and The Netherlands and rowed across the North Sea. They made a series of attacks on different parts of the country over a period of years and under a number of leaders. The Angles settled in East Anglia. The Saxons settled in areas of Essex (East Saxons), Sussex (South Saxons), Middlesex (Middle Saxons), and Wessex (West Saxons).



They grew:
