What should I already know?

In EYFS we looked at different ways of moving in a space successfully, anticlockwise as a direction, comparing similarities and differences of people and places and 2D shapes. We also learned about the features of my immediate environment and how environments might vary from one another. Last term, we studied seasonal and daily weather patterns in the UK, looked at our school grounds and created a simple map using symbols in a key. We used directional language to describe a location on a map.

Key vocabulary:

Capital City - The capital city, often called the capital, is the one from where the government of a country works.

Commonwealth - The Commonwealth is a family of 53 countries from all over the world.

Estate - area of land in the country, usually with a large house, owned by one person, family, or organization.

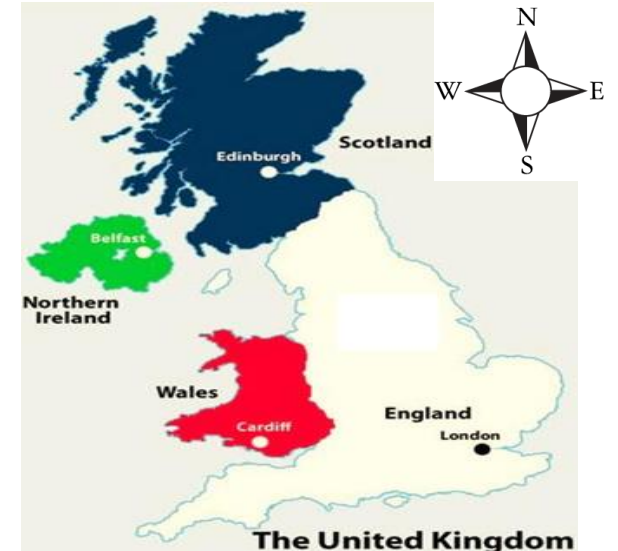
Residence - a person's home, especially a large and impressive one.

Palace - a large and impressive building forming the official residence of a ruler, pope or archbishop.

Castle - a large building or group of buildings usually having high walls with towers that was built in the past to protect against attack

Human - something that is built by humans and would not have existed in nature without humans

Physical = natural features including oceans, mountains, lakes, rivers,
