

Geography: How did pre-historic Britain shape my life?

What should I already know?

In KS1, I have identified seasonal weather patterns in the UK and made comparisons between each season. I compared physical and human geography of Bolton, London and Jamaica. I explored my local area of Bolton before moving onto countries located within the United Kingdom and their capital cities. I developed my knowledge of the United Kingdom with a study of London including famous landmarks. I devised a map of the school grounds and used symbols in a key and used directional language to follow directions. I am confident with locating hot and cold areas of the world and understand how the countries near the equator are usually warm. I can also locate the 7 continents and seas and have an understanding of where the UK is in relation to the equator. I have explored the North and South pole.

Region	An area of land that has common feature. A region can be defined by natural or artificial features. Language, government, or religion can define a region, as can forests, wildlife, or climate.
County	A region that has its own government.
Landscape	A landscape means an area of land as one can see it. 7 different types of landscapes include: mountains, coasts, deserts, woodlands and rainforests.
Countryside	The land or scenery in a rural area.
Rural	A rural is an area located outside towns and cities.
Urban	An urban area is a built up area like a city or town with a high population.



During the last age, huge areas of northern England were covered by glaciers. This affected the area that is now called the Lake District.
